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our present conceptions of regions into the Constitution.

Now are there any other questions that, policy

questions that are raised between the two approaches?

THE CHAIRMAN: No, I don't think there are any others. I think some of these questions telescope into one another. I don't think there are as many as you indicate. As a last one, I think there is no disagreement that the determination of what the region should be is a legislative function.

I don't think anyone has suggested that
the various local governments can determine the regions.

I think this is all agreed, this is a legislative function.
There is a difference as to whether they can be called
into being only by the Legislature or called into being
by the local governments concerned, or the people concerned.

MR. SYKES: I have one other question and
I am through. In the Committee draft, the language is
that the General Assembly can provide for counties and
other civil divisions including regional governments and
intergovernmental authorities. I am afraid that that
language may lead to the assumption that a regional
