28 are ones which are dealing with and truly with intergovernmental problems transcending local boundaries, such as the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission is the National Capital Park and Planning Commission and the Baltimore Port Authority and so forth.

The rest of them are nothing more than mere soil conservation areas or drainage areas or something of that kind. The 115 that are referred; to in Prince Georges County are not truly authorities as such. They are merely special purpose districts and there is nothing to stop the County Commissioners from dissolving them if and when they saw fit to do so.

Similarly, there would be nothing that would prevent the General Assembly from defining and imposing the restrictions insofar as the extent and service of the authorities which it may create is concerned. So I say once again in conclusion, let's leave to the General Assembly the degree of responsibility and the flexibility with which to meet that responsibility as these problems arise and as they can best be dealt with by all of the power of inquiry and debate of the General Assembly
