The Congress had the power in regard to the western territories. Nothing was frozen solidly. It was just a viewpoint that was necessary in terms of those times and I think in the same way, Mr. Chairman, our viewpoint, as far as the 1960's are concerned, needs to be so stated.

JUDGE ADKINS: Mr. Chairman, my thinking has changed in the course of this discussion. I am in favor of the Committee's viewpoint of not trying to categorize or skelctonize the regional governments. It seems to me that the arguments in favor of it are arguments properly made before a Committee of the Legislature or before the Legislature and not made at this body. I do not think we should attempt to write the wisdom of the movement into a formula for the future. It seems to me that is what we are trying to do if we now prescribe for alltime what the nature of the regional government should be. I am conscious of the fact that the Committee, the Commission wants to give an impetus to this movement but it does not seem to me this is the way to do it. I think I agree with Mr. Clagedt
