were directing our attention to a, to the Constitution requiring regions and a skeleton of their government. By our vote where we, were the Committee recommends merely that the General Assembly may create regional governments, is it implicit that we are not going ahead and recommending any particular structure either in the form of a charter or other skeleton?

THE CHAIRMAN: That's true.

MR. CLAGETT: Very well.

THE CHAIRMAN: Now the question for discussion is whether, if the Legislature creates regions, there shall be any constitutional limitation on the number and if so, what the number should be.

JUDGE ADKINS: I would speak in favor of no constitutional limitation and I would use what I consider to be prime Exhibit A, that the opportunity to make an error is contained in the Chairman's draft of 11.02 where he creates an Eastern District consisting of ten counties.

THE CHAIRMAN: Ten. It should be nine.

JUDGE ADKINS: Nine counties which would thereby create a governmental unit which is 150 miles
