seems to me that if we were to follow Mr. Clagett's suggestion and leave this solely to the Legislature, we 2 would not have had even yet a charter government in Baltimore County. In Baltimore County there was a movement as early as 1919 to get a charter set up. 5 failed in a vote of the people. But the delegation from 6 Baltimore County in the General Assembly has, from my 7 observation, for three decades been at odds with this Ð kind of thing and the powers of the political organizeq tion there even when the final proposition came up for 10 a charter government, the people who went to the Legisla-11 ture from Baltimore County were opposed to the formation 12 of a charter because they held the power over what 13 went on in Baltimore County through their control of

local legislation in the General Assembly.

It seems to me there are times at least when the local community, the people, or the local governments ought to have a chance to activate the government in a region.
