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but if it attempted to legislate through the region or through the intergovernmental authority, it would be subject to the restriction imposed and can only do so by general law as defined.

MR. HAILE: I don't think so.

DR. BURDETTE: I have read the language and I don't think that is in the language.

MR. CLAGETT: Which one were you reading, Franklin?

DR. BURDETTE: I was reading 11.02.

MR. CLAGETT: Of the Staff?

DR. BURDETTE: No, of yours.

MR. GENTRY: Read the staff.

MR. CLAGETT: Insofar as our draft is concerned and the recommendation of the Committee is that we do not impose any discriminatory restrictions other than the General Assembly only may provide for the basic units of government, namely the counties or other civil division which may include regional governments or intergovernmental authorities.

MR. SYKES: Can I point out that you define
