 MR . SYKES: You mentioned be uniformly applicable. That is much different from applicable in its terms and effects because it may be uniformly applicable in its terms and may have different effects in different counties and may have no effect in some.

THE CHAIRMAN: It seems to me the phrase uniformly applicable would be better than the other phrase.

 $$\operatorname{DR}_{\star}$$ BURDETTE: How about uniformly applicable in its terms and effect?

MR. CIAGETT: I think as the courts have determined in terms and effect it has been given the interpretation of uniform in its application and since, as I mentioned earlier, the words have been given judicial interpretation and are subject to definition that the Committee would prefer to continue to use those terms rather than effect another term which may have to go through the process of definition when brought into question in the future.
