I like the idea of just establishing the Lieutenant Governor without putting in the way the abolition of the Secretary of State at this point.

Secondly, I would like to say in answer to Dr. Winslow's statement that some of us who were tied in with the charter revision of Baltimore City had this same question to ask in regard to the administrative officer.
