parties and geographic areas, et cetera. No unanimity of opinion that I could detect as to which might be preferable.

One other big thing that I noticed in discussions not only of constitutional revision generally but of the problem with which we are struggling very hard, namely, the question of political subdivisions, was that the situations varied so greatly from state to state that it is exceedingly dangerous to look to what another state has done in this area and indeed in any area of constitutional revision without knowing fairly accurately what the political organization of the state is not only as to political parties but as to organization of the geographic and political subdivisions of the state.

In Maryland, as all of us know, the county is the predominant political organization but in many states the county has almost ceased to exist as a governing unit. Unless this fact is recognized when you look at the procedures being considered by a particular state, it is very difficult to try to use what they do
