as a model for us.

For instance, in some states, as New Jersey and Pennsylvania, the entire state is divided into incorporated municipalities so there is not one square foot of either of those states that is not included in an incorporated municipality. The result is their attitudes toward counties and to municipalities is exactly the converse of ours. They think of the county as merely a group that has some historical and traditional status but really is not being meaningful in the sense of governing. Yet they cannot understand at all how we can possibly govern in Maryland without municipalities to accomplish the job on the local level.

A number of other situations exist in this area which left me with a feeling that we cannot in solving the problems of metropolitan areas even though they were discussed at tremendous length in the Boston conference, we cannot simply look to what some other state has done and adapt it to our purposes. We have got to look at the problem in our own way. I think this
