DR.BURDETTE: I realize that. That I am not sure in my own mind that there is any absolute clear prohibition to the situation that you discussed, that Lieutenant Governor couldn't be the former Governor.

THE CHAIRMAN: I take it that what Mr. Power was saying is since the Lieutenant Governor must possess the qualifications to be Governor, if he had served as Governor for two terms he was therefore not qualified to be Governor. Hence he could not qualify as Lieutenant Governor.

DR. BURDETTE: That is very dubious as to whether it is a qualification or explanation. I should think the Court of Appeals would wrestle with that one.

MR. MELVIN: Mr. Chairman, I would agree with Judge Burdette on that. I don't see where the Lieutenant Governor is prevented or where a Governoer who has served two terms cannot immediately be a Lieutenant Governor for another four years. I don't see the language that prevents that.

MR. CASE: It is there but it is a little tough.
