be determined in accordance with law. Our thought would simply be that there would be perhaps a follow-up legislation passed by the Legislature. I don't think we feel this is not a point on which we are at all adamant. If you want to spell it out in the Constitution, we would be very happy to prescribe much the same procedure as now is, namely --

MR. CASE: Majority vote of the House and Senate combined.

JUDGE ADKINS: That is right, majority vote of the Houses.

DR. BURDETTE: I hope you tighten that language because this sentence you have in no way limits the law to deal with the two persons involved in the tie. The law prescribes some other means choosing some other candidate.

MR. SCANLAN: You have to have a little faith in the Legislature. If we are going to put restrictions to hedge against every possibility, including the highly unlikely mathematical probability that Dale referred to, you would have a document as long as the one we are trying
