charter of the county, if you are going to give them home rule.

MR. CLAGETT: Mr. Chairman, I would say to that, that that situation, assuming that that situation could exist, could not exist more than four years and it seems to me --

THE CHAIRMAN: Why do you say that?

MR. CLAGETT: Because after a four-year period, the non-charter counties would have a charter.

THE CHAIRMAN: I see what you mean.

MR. CLAGETT: And certainly it is to be contemplated that any charter of a county, however it's adopted, will include some such restriction as we are envisaging here or will make some provision for it and I merely suggest that it would be a very real departure and mistake to now write into the Constitution a restriction upon a broad grant of power which we are giving for the purpose of vitalizing and stimulating a county government, and to now come along and start putting restrictions upon it would be a mistake.
