DR. BURDETTE: Mr. Chairman, can I ask, somewhat out of order, Mr. Case to look at 11.02(c), in which the General Assembly may authorize intergovernmental authorities to borrow money? Shouldn't that be at least to borrow money for a public purpose? We just didn't get that one covered in this discussion.

MR. CLAGETT: Well, can the General Assembly authorize an intergovernmental authority to borrow money which would exceed the authority of the General Assembly?

DR. BURDETTE: I don't know.

THE CHAIRMAN: Well, conceivably. If we didn't have this limitation we just adopted, I suppose the General Assembly could authorize the county to borrow money without the provisions in Section 34.

MR. CASE: Wouldn't it be sensible to include intergovernmental authorities with counties? I think we should. I think Dr. Burdette is correct here, that authorities ought to be in with the counties.

THE CHAIRMAN: If they have the right to borrow money, it seems to me --  $\,$ 

DR. BURDETTE: I thought so, in the first place.
