

1 doing that operates as a brake line.

2 MR. CLAGETT: And the difficulty is built in, in  
3 that it's got to be at least three counties and there could  
4 be no more than five classifications at any one time.

5 THE CHAIRMAN: No more than one classification  
6 at any one time.

7 MR. CLAGETT: No more than one classification  
8 with five classes.

9 DR. BARD: But it doesn't tell how long that may  
10 last, but one day.

11 MR. BROOKS: But those laws enacted that deal  
12 with classification won't apply to whatever counties are  
13 taken out of the class, so that you destroy what you did  
14 the day before and that's the brake on the whole system.

15 MR. CLAGETT: I want to point out that by this  
16 dual approach you do give a degree of flexibility to the  
17 General Assembly which you would otherwise be denying it.

18 DR. BARD: I'd like, as Mr. Case has said, both  
19 flexibility and dependability.

20 THE CHAIRMAN: Any further questions as to
