withdraw it from the region, in order not to open this
gate, to take away, and to complete the classification
restriction.
In other words, the General Assembly could

In other words, the General Assembly could take whatever powers it wanted to exercise and vest them in a regional government and then withdraw it and vest it in the powers they have themselves. As I mentioned a while ago, also a part of this over-all question is whether or not the classification system is restricted to the population criterion or is open-ended. I mentioned why it has to be open-ended as it is stated now.

On the other hand, if this other approach is adopted, then there is a lot of reason why it should not be open-ended and that is that if you permit a classification system under this alternative which can be organized any way, the General Assembly could very readily organize a classification system that completely parallels whatever kind of regional government structure that is established.

For instance, say five regions are established

and we permit under the classification system as many as five classes, so the General Assembly therefore could
