DR. BARD: Mr. Chairman, will Mr. Brooks please
go back to the point he made with respect to the fact that
perhaps it can be based upon the population alone?
THE CHAIRMAN: No, the other way around, now.

DR. BARD: Is it? The other way around?

I wasn't clear.

MR. BROOKS: Now, the classification is irrelevant to that part of this document which permits the establishment of regional governments. It is not necessary for any stage of the activation or the establishment or creation of regions or regional governments and for that reason it is no longer necessary, as far as that part of the document is concerned, for the criteria of the establishment of classes to be anything more than population.

DR. BURDETTE: That is what you are advocating?

MR. BROOKS: I say it is not necessary that it be any more than that. It still could be, but it is not necessary.

DR. BURDETTE: And it is as we have the language now.
