MR. BROOKS: Yes.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Martineau?

MR. MARTINEAU: Just to clarify my own thinking, is it correct that the effect of 11.03(c) implies an exception for the specific grants of power to the General Assembly stated in, say Section 11.01, with respect to the creation, incorporation, changing, merging, dissolution and the alteration of boundaries? As I understand it, the General Assembly could pass a law changing the boundaries of Baltimore County and Baltimore City and that this, of course, would not be a general public law by its very terms.

THE CHAIRMAN: That's correct.

MR. MARTINEAU: So that there is an implied exception in 11.03(c), that they can adopt any general public law and any other law specifically authorized by the Constitution.

THE CHAIRMAN: That is in effect what it means, yes.

MR. MARTINEAU: Is there any necessity to say that, because we've already made an exception with respect
