a palatableness, insofar as the use of this word is concerned, rather than by the use of the word charter, by the action of its own governing body or by a petition of the majority of the voters in that county.

THE CHAIRMAN: Dr. Burdette?

DR. BURDETTE: I have two questions. I should like to read this Section (a) as if there were in the second line a comma after governing body and in the third line a comma after petition, so that it doesn't say the governing body has to get a petition and, so far as I know, that is the intent of the Committee, and I have another question --

THE CHAIRMAN: I think this is the intent, is it not, Mr. Clagett?

MR. CLAGETT: It is the intent.

THE CHAIRMAN: Comma after body and a comma after petition.

DR. BURDETTE: That makes it clearer. The other question I have is more a matter of substance. I wonder why we couldn't allow the General Assembly to provide for more than one instrument of government or optional
