merely for the existing.

THE CHAIRMAN: Would your purpose be accomplished if you didn't use this nasty word charter and used instrument of government throughout?

MR. CLAGETT: Yes.

THE CHAIRMAN: I would like to let Dr.Burdette address himself to that, because he and I are in accord to the extent that I have said what I said, with the exception of maybe -- no, we're in accord all the way through.

DR. BURDETTE: Except on one point. My philosophy on this, as I expressed it to the Committee, has been that we ought to leave to the county within reasonable Constitutional process real home rule for the construction of a county government, that the State of Maryland does not need to decide whether or not we have an elected Executive or a Council, in the Council Manager form, or in the County Commissioner form, and in still another form which might be included as is precluded by 11(a), and that is that the executive should be a part of the legislative body at the same time as the executive.
