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instrument of government. I guess it is clear in my mind. I think you had a better word at hand which you did use in 11.04(b).

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Clagett?

MR. CLACETT: I would only like to add that we met for what was it, about five hours, and we used practically all of the suggestions in one way or another that have been made here and finally came to the instrument of government being the one that fitted most neatly. It also, as you look up charter, is one of the phrases to define a charter in the dictionary. I don't think anybody is going to have any great difficulty in understanding what is meant here. I think Dr. Winslow's suggestions gets us into an area where there are differences, and where the differences get cumbersome as you try to deal with them later on.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any further discussion? Are you ready for the question? The question arises on the motion to amend the pending motion by substituting the word charter, for the word, instrument of government, wherever they appear in Section 11.04(a). A vote Aye is in
