then to be recognized as a charter government and at the same time most of them probably will comply with the Constitution and the power structure, et cetera, and if they don't, they amend their Constitution to so provide.

MR. CLAGETT: Then, Mr. Chairman, if we added the language in Subsection (b), the existing charter -- the Counties which now have a charter shall continue. Wait a minute. That isn't it. All Counties which presently have a charter, as well as those Counties which have not adopted an instrument of government or General Assembly plan has become effective shall have those powers provided in the Constitution. Would that do it?

THE CHAIRMAN: No. You would still have powers. Would this perhaps do it: Until such time as the County adopts an instrument of government or the instrument of government proposed by the General Assembly becomes effective, the structure of existing County governments shall continue in effect as the instrument of government for such Counties, or something to that effect.

MR. CLACETT: Except that you haven't got a structure for the County Commissioners.
