MR. CLAGETT: I really didn't think Dr. Burdette's objection here went that far because I am looking now to the record back in the transcript at Page 215 of the proceeding at the Brown Estate, where the doctor was dissenting from the charters of existing localities being changed by the Counties, and here we said that the Counties couldn't change the existing, and we are now saying, the Counties can't change the existing charter to take care of your objection at that time, so why do you feel so fundamentally opposed to it?

DR. BURDETTE: It would seem to me clear, this is, of course, the death knell for alternate powers in the State before very long.

MR. CLAGETT: Isn't that view now because right now by act of the General Assembly no new municipalities can be created except by consent of the County on dissolution. The County enters into the picture and must take over the liabilities as well as the assets?

DR. BURDETTE: This, you see, is the statute for a time and place. I think there would be no doubt that that law could be emended by the General Assembly,
