were badly enough needed. We don't need any more 150
population towns created, but if you are really going
to say that Hagerstown and Cumberland are absolutely
straitjacketed the same as the Counties are going to
allow them to develop, this may be very tight business.

MR. CLACETT: I think that brings into focus something else. There were back in 1960, 152 municipalities in the entire State. There are now 149, because three of them have been dissolved. Of that remaining 149, some 115 are of a population of less than 2500 persons. Now, with that staring us in the face, we feel, and the Committee, I thought, was in agreement, that the trend of the future was toward a dissolution of municipal corporations as a device of local subdivisions.

DR. BURDETTE: Unfortunately, we don't touch that. We say they can't be dissolved without consent.

THE CHAIRMAN: Let me interrupt. This is an interesting dialogue, but the rest of us are merely sitting by. I don't think we are accomplishing anything.

I would like to get clear, and then anyone who wants to make a motion can do so, what the recommen-
