have appeared before the Committee, and who have appeared before the Commission, are ones which would justify this language being included in the Constitution, even though, of course, it may be quite true that there is nothing presently in the Constitution, in the Maryland Constitution, that would prohibit the Counties from entering into agreement, or the State entering into agreement, except with Federal Constitution restrictions in the compact clause. It would be a means whereby this method would be available, pointed up, and direct the cooperative effort in that direction to solve the problems which are related to those areas.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any further discussion?

I think, I think personally there is serious problem with such a provision, because I would be fearful that this would mean perhaps that a municipality or a County or some other civil division, regional government, could enter into arguments with another State or with the Federal Government without the consent of and against the desires of the State. This is an area that is becoming exceedingly touchy right now with the broad
