in order to have certain programs, the local subdivisions
have to participate. I think this is too far-reaching
for us to approve. It upsets the entire financial
structure of the State. I think it goes beyond what a
Constitution should do.

MR. CLAGETT: Specifically this matter is dealt with in the Third Report of the Committee, dated May 27, 1966, and there the recommendation was that where the State Legislature created jobs, and government agencies, which must be paid for by the local subdivisions, the Committee felt that the Constitution should require that any such State Legislature requiring financial payment by the local subdivisions must first be submitted to the local government of the subdivision for approval and also subject to a permissive referendum by the voters of the subdivision.

We found that that was too cumbersome to try to deal with insofar as constitutional language was concerned, and therefore boiled it down to the present recommendation that you have got in front of you. I don't believe the Commission as such has ever acted upon it,
