and I think all of us feel, that this isn't a problem in the county which is going to have one delegate or perhaps two, relatively small counties. He feels that the people in the county, even without any great organizing efforts, will sort of almost by unanimous consent agree that the outstanding person in that particular county is so and so and that he would be elected.

He thinks there is a very, very serious problem in the counties with the large number of delegates, but does not limit this concern to counties with as many as Baltimore County. He thinks, for instance, even in Montgomery County, with as many as sixteen, you have a very serious problem and a problem somewhat akin to Baltimore County, in that your dense centers of population are relatively few in number but are highly concentrated.

I think -- he certainly did not express any strong convictions as to the best way to insure the election of delegates, but I think it's fair to say that he certainly feels that, on balance, there is a better chance with district elections. He recognizes as all of
