and Chevy Chase think they have all the brains in their end of the county, but Silver Spring disagrees. This is a literal indication of a sour note to the contrary.

MR. SCANLAN: Chevy Chase and Bethesda also have a higher preponderance of the other end.

MR. HARGROVE: We have been talking about control of the political machine, but has there been any discussion or has anything come to your attention in regard to the plain, simple unwieldiness of an atlarge election, particularly in Baltimore County and the counties, for example, I think Dr. Winslow says in Baltimore County you would probably have 22 people to elect and, in an at-large election, this becomes, at least from the experience in Baltimore City, becomes a rather difficult and certainly chaotic type of election.

THE CHAIRMAN: Yes, we have had this comment. This has been one of the very strong objections. People have said to us with reference to Baltimore County that if you have at-large, that means you are going to have at least 100 to 125 names on the ballot and maybe more, and this is an impossible situation, and those who
