who were invited to attend, in fact, there were several hundred persons. The group had four to -- there were four places to be filled and the group endorsed four and they were all elected and my observation was when you get down to the brass tacks of it, they had no really great opposition. While there was no opposition, except in the case of one of the four, it turned out to be quite

The question I'm really raising, and perhaps Mr. Scanlan will help us, whether or not that would help in some of the counties, if there would be a civic movement and people would be asked to express their interest and those who wanted to be endorsed, it would in essence become a community experience.

MR. SCANLAN: I remember the School Board election. They stole that idea from Colonel Brooke Lce. We had the same thing in the 1952 campaign. We had a convention open to all Democrats. It's no surprise that the slate represented Colonel Lee's choices. Therefore, it was no surprise to me that the candidates of the School Board primarily reflected the philosophy of the

the minority.
