confusion.

Number one, there is the complexity of it. Two, it's sort of placing some discrimination.

You are placing the delegates on non-equal footing.

Some of the delegates would have to run county-wide and the others have a relatively smaller area in which to campaign. Finally, after they are elected, human nature being what it is, those elected from the county at-large would somehow get the idea they carry a more active mandate from the people.

MR. BOND: I wonder if we could get an answer to Dr. Bard's question, which is how many counties have districts and how many representatives run?

MR. BROOKS: I think there are only four.

The statute requires any county with over a certain number of representatives is to subdivide them and elect them on a county-wide basis, and I think that number is eight. As far as I know, I think Anne Arundel is the smallest that qualifies. So, it's Prince Georges, Montgomery, Baltimore County and Anna Arundel.

MR. BOND: Those are the four countles.
