implemented and it could hurt the whole idea of a Constitutional Convention by causing a lot of delay and argument in the Legislature. That's my first reaction.

The second is, I feel if you think the thing through, of a nominating convention, again you've got to go back to your interested segments of your population and your people and I think you are going to have real problems in ever getting such a thing set up. I wish Mr. Scanlan good luck, but I don't see how it can be done.

THE CHAIRMAN: Dr. Burdette?

DR. BURDETTE: Could I comment on this point, that the Montgomery County arrangement was not in essence a legal nominating convention. It was simply a group which got up a slate and anyone else could file who pleased to do so, but considering the civic prominence of the convention and the way it was open to the large part of the citizenry, very few of us did file.

MR. BOND: This could very well happen.

DR. BURDETTE: There was no legislation.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Della?
