I understand it, I am afraid I wasn't at the meeting when this was discussed, the Commission expressed the opinion at one time that this was inappropriate; if someone is mentally incompetent, he should not be allowed to vote and the General Assembly should not be given the power to say he can vote.

MR. MILES: The point is who determines whether he is mentally incompetent?

MR. CLAGETT: Aren't we actually worried about something that isn't necessary because the presumption would certainly be that he was mentally incompetent until somebody contested it, and when it was contested and it was proven that at the time he cast his vote that he was crazy, then you have got the determination, and if nobody chooses to contest it, then the presumption would carry?

MR. CLAGETT: By claiming he was mentally incompetent.

MR. CASE: When?

THE CHAIRMAN: On the day of election?
