MR. SCANLAN: Suppose the sentence read, the General Assembly may by law exclude from voting those persons who are mentally incompetent or who have been convicted of serious crimes. Is that your intention? Is that what you mean?

MR. GENTRY: Well, myself I would buy that, but actually it was felt by the Committee that on a question of incompetenccy it should not be left -- incompetency was different from a disqualification by reason of conviction. We are disqualifying those convicted. The only thing we are leaving to the Legislature is the enumeration of the crimes which are serious. Disqualification for incompetency was felt something that would be a constitutional measure.

MR. MILES: I don't understand how there could be any objection to saying no persons could be eligible to vote during such time as he shall have been judicially declared to have been mentally incompetent.
