That means therefore that the delegates would have to be elected at a special election. This, of course, has the disadvantage perhaps of reducing the turnout of the electorate. On the other hand, it would enhance the possibilities that the election for delegates would be truly a nonpartisan election, somewhat free of the usual bitter partisanship that creeps into all our Maryland elections.

In any event, we have no real choice but
we would recommend that the Commission recommend that
the delegates to the September 12, 1967, constitutional
convention be elected in the special election held
on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of the month
of June, 1967.

I think in an earlier report, one of our first, we were able to provide some idea of what a special election would cost. I think the Attorney General's office said \$750,000 at that time. It might be a little on the low side.
