pass something. I admit there is a difference of opinion here.

MR. MELVIN: What would you contemplate a quorum would be?

MR. SCANLAN: A quorum would be one more than half.

MR. CASE: Mr. Chairman, I think Mr. Melvin's apprehension on this penhaps runs from his service in the Legislature where you do have the requirement of a constitutional majority. But there is a difference here because when you are dealing with legislative process, a bill is passed and it goes to the Governor and moves out of the deliberative body, whereas, in this case. I take it an issue can be perhaps settled by a majority of those present. But then if that doesn't seem to be a sound thing to do, it can be reconsidered before it moves out. So there is nothing really final about it until the constitution itself is locked up and put in the final press. I think this is the difference. think that's why Mr. Scanlan's suggestion probably is proper.
