10 lan did was compress 1, 2 and 4 without any change in
11 context. Mr. Case has raised the question, that Section 2
12 as now written would mean that there would be a matter
13 of right of every individual to attend college, State
14 college, without regard to whether or not the school
15 admitted them for intellectual or educational requirements.
16 I think that fails when you consider the differences
17 between the first part of Section 1 and what we have done
18 in Section 2. In Section 1, we have said, as to the
19 statewide system of free public schools, sufficient for
20 the education and open to all children of school age.
