every child has a right to public education. With regard to the system of higher education, by merely providing, by not saying it is full-scale, complete, or any other words, by the very elimination of the fact that it is open to all children as a matter of right, I think that the interpretation would be that it is not.

MRS. BOTHE: We gave a lot of consideration to this thought. We recognized the possibility of it. As a matter of fact, it had something to do with our reasons for separating Sections 1 and 2 because we feel the basic concept was completely different. One provided for a mandatory, open to all system of public education, covering the elementary schools. The other merely establishes an entirely different thing, and that is a system of higher education, which is not necessarily open to any particular people. It merely exists on its own right.

MRS. FREEDLANDER: Mr. Case, as a former member of the State Board of Education, I believe you were a member of the State Board of Education and a member of the Board of Regents of the University of Maryland, I am sure you are aware of the fact that we have an excellent school
