in any way require either the University of Maryland, the State colleges, Morgan Gollege or any of the other institutions of higher learning that come hereafter, to admit any and every student who may have graduated from secondary schools in Maryland. I don't know the answer to that, but before I vote on the substance of this, I would like to see the answer to it. I have heard opinions of people here around this table, and I have the greatest respect for those opinions.

MR. MILLER: Second the motion.

MR. CASE: It still seems to me this point ought to be determined through basic research and not just what we think sitting around this table.

DR. BARD: I would certainly agree with the
