provide; in the first part of Section 1, you have two conditions that are not in the second, a statewide system and free public schools, but in the second part of Section 1, and in Section 2, you have the language, be provided, which would leave it open, it seems to me for the argument to be made that the obligation of the General Assembly was as great in the second clause of Section 1 and in Section 2 as it was in the first, which would mean to provide a complete system of higher education.

Now, I am not suggesting that they shouldn't be authorized to do so, but I want to know whether this is deliberate and whether the Committee intends to impose the same broad obligation on the Legislature to provide other public educational institutions in the one case and a system of higher education in the other, as you impose on it with respect to the public schools in the first clause.

MRS. FREEDLANDER: In answer to the Section 1, the second section, Mr. Eney, we separate it from the first because there are fees attached ofttimes to the second section, and so they are not free, and they are not open
