2 THE CHAIRMAN: I don't use complete in quite
3 that sense. What worries me is a system that would provide
4 enough colleges throughout the State to be available for
5 all college students, and I take it this means public
6 colleges.

7 MRS. ROTHE: Mr. Chairman, it may be, and I
8 can't personally see where it would be subject to this
9 construction, and I say this partly because we picked up
10 most of this language from compilations of other consti-
11 tutions which have been in effect. I don't think there
12 is any State in the Union where every child is entitled to
13 higher education or where the State must maintain a state-
14 wide system of higher education, and yet many other State
15 Constitutions do make or give constitutional recognition
16 to a higher educational system. We just couldn't believe
17 that we were running into the kind of terrors that Mr.
18 Case envisages, after seeing on a practical working basis
19 provisions of this kind in existence, and I think more
20 states than most.

21 MR. CASE: May I say in answer to that, it is
