and shall be governed by the Board of Regents which shall have general supervision of the institution and the control and direction of all expenditures from the institution's funds. The Board shall consist of 11 members or such greater number as provided by law who shall be appointed by the governor (by and with the advice and consent of the Senate) for a term of 7 years.

This provision is recommended after a great deal of consideration. It is the unanimous recommendation of our Committee. We heard from Dr. Elkins and Dr. Cohen. We examined the constitutions, particularly the more recent ones of a number of other States. We considered the particular problems of the State University which, as you all know, particularly Mr. Case, is a major institution within the State. The institution is now by statute granted autonomy, but Dr. Elkins pointed out to us that the statutory position is not immune from attack, and in fact, although the law has only been in effect since 1952, has been, there have been inroads made upon it.

We felt that the State University itself should be recognized in the Constitution; that it is of sufficient importance to the State as to require it:
