this holds true for the University of Maryland. I, for one, would keep this in for the University of Maryland, but do the same for the State colleges.

As for the junior colleges, I believe the statement ought to differ some because their funds come from local political units, as well as from the State, and to have a parallel statement for the community colleges would be wrong in that we would freeze a State system of community colleges on the State of Maryland at this point when there is no readiness for it.

MR. SAYRE: You don't need it in the Constitution, do you?

DR. BARD: The only thing I think you would need, and I have felt all along, that I like the idea of a separate section on higher education, and the rational for it is given in this paper. I would divide that separate section so that you have a subsection on the University of Maryland, another subsection on State colleges, and a mere statement that might be exhortation in regard to the significance of the community colleges and the importance of State aid in terms of the higher educational system,
