ment of the Legislature has already indicated that counties may not be represented as such in the Senate and any forecast of what is going to come up in the next census would indicate, it seems to me, quite clearly that an attempt to keep representation by counties, unless county lines are changed, is a movement in the direction of following New Hampshire. New Hampshire has followed a principle for a long time that every town must be represented, and the result is that New Hampshire has a House of Delegates, until recently at least, of 400 members. We saw what happened in the House of Representatives in Washington when there was complete freedom to follow the line of least resistance. The number of members in the House of Representatives grew every decennial until they got completely out of hand, and I think it is safe to say that if we follow this one county, one representative principle, we will after the decennial census of 1970 of necessity have a House of Delegates of at least 200 people. This suggests to me that somebody along the line is giving to have to put a quietus on this addition of number of delegates, and I, for one, would
