6 MR. MILES: Mr. Chairman, may I, as a point  
7 of inquiry, as the Committee's consultant, and I am ask-  
8 ing because I don't know the answer, is there any State,  
9 and if so, how many States in the country have a consti-  
10 tution set up whereby every county in the State is  
11 assured of a representation in one house or the other?  
12 Do you know of any State where every county is not repre-  
13 sented in either one house or the other?

14 DR. WINSLOW: Of course, you eliminate New  
15 England, where the county is not the basis of represen-  
16 tation, but the town has rather been. Those we would  
17 have to throw out as not affecting the situation with  
18 respect to counties.

19 There are several States, and I am sorry I  
20 cannot name them precisely, where every legislative dis-  
21 trict consists of more than one county, so that an
