ten more or less and several of the members of your Committee have indicated they weren't particularly enamoured of the ten. I wonder if the question should be split and have a vote first on the question of whether there should be a limitation.

MR. MILES: Mr. Chairman, may I, as a point of inquiry, as the Committee's consultant, and I am asking because I don't know the answer, is there any State, and if so, how many States in the country have a constitution set up whereby every county in the State is assured of a representation in one house or the other?

Do you know of any State where every county is not represented in either one house or the other?

DR. WINSLOW: Of course, you eliminate New England, where the county is not the basis of representation, but the town has rather been. Those we would have to throw out as not affecting the situation with respect to counties.

There are several States, and I am sorry I cannot name them precisely, where every legislative district consists of more than one county, so that an
