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here is getting something done within a certain time.

MR. SCANLAN: That is right.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Case?

MR. CASE: Mr. Chairman, the words, One calendar year, bother me a little bit, because conceivably this means that you could go twenty-three and a half months after the official publication of the census before the Legislature would have to act. Coming back to your point, Franklin, in 1982 this would put us past -- in the 1980's it would put you up to 1986. It seems to me

that -- I haven't got any real strong feeling about this, but keeping with the idea of getting something done, an eighteen-month period, an outside period of eighteen months from the day rather than saying one calendar year after, because calendar year, of course, you could go all the way to the current year and you haven't got a

DR. BURDETTE: Some date before the next election or before the filling dates for the primaries for the next election, something like that.

MR. CASE: Yes. The term, One calendar year,
