

1 the court ordering, the court appointing or requiring  
2 the appointment of a commission to do the job. Has this  
3 been considered?

4 DR. BARD: We have not considered it, but I  
5 for one, would think that it would be a good idea.

6 MR. MILLER: All that would be necessary to  
7 place the matter in the hands of the court, they undoubtedly-  
8 ly would appoint a commission, but if they wanted to sit  
9 and spend hours and days doing it themselves, we would  
10 have no objection. I would suggest that we leave out  
11 anything about a commission, that it just be placed in  
12 the hands of the Supreme Court of Appeals.

13 THE CHAIRMAN: I don't know that they would  
14 undoubtedly appoint a commission. The Federal Court  
15 didn't, the three judges acted on their own.

16 MR. MILLER: It should be in my opinion in their  
17 discretion, whether they appoint a special master or com-  
18 mission or whatever they might do, but if the responsibility  
19 is with them, that is as far as we can go.

20 THE CHAIRMAN: It seems to me there are three
