the court ordering, the court appointing or requiring the appointment of a commission to do the job. Has this been considered?

DR. BARD: We have not considered it, but I for one, would think that it would be a good idea.

MR. MILLER: All that would be necessary to place the matter in the hands of the court, they undoubtedly would appoint a commission, but if they wanted to sit and spend hours and days doing it themselves, we would have no objection. I would suggest that we leave out anything about a commission, that it just be placed in the hands of the Supreme Court of Appeals.

THE CHAIRMAN: I don't know that they would undoubtedly appoint a commission. The Federal Court didn't, the three judges acted on their own.

It should be in my opinion in their MR. MILLER: discretion, whether they appoint a special master or commission or whatever they might do, but if the responsibility is with them, that is as far as we can go.
