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the risk of losing the right to create one?

MR. CLAGETT: According to Section 3. You say as nearly as practicable. How do we understand that?

MR. MARTINEAU: You open the door to flexibility in Section 3 and close it with Section 5.

It means the Legislature makes THE CHAIRMAN: a determination at its peril. That is what you come up with.

MR. CLACETT: I think that is the answer.

Is there any further discussion? THE CHAIRMAN:

MR: MILLER: Only this comment, Mr. Chairman.

It seems to me that the Supreme Court of Appeals is the final dictator in this matter; that if we follow Mr. Case's suggestion and say it has to be done by a certain time, the responsibility will rest on them to either find the plan, if made by the Legislature, valid or invalid, and if it is invalid, make one that is valid, because they are the only ones that can say whether it is valid or not.

MR. HAILE: That would stay in effect until the next census then.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any further discussion? Mr. Sayrd?
