

1 in that direction and says in effect, the Legislature  
2 just won't do it, and Senator Hoff has said the same  
3 thing. You waste a lot of time, and you get nowhere in  
4 trying to carry out that theory, which is good, but if  
5 you let the Executive Department take the problem right  
6 initially and go right ahead and get it done and get it  
7 done promptly.

8 DR. TEMPLETON: I would agree with him in part,  
9 but I think you are disregarding a recommendation made  
10 by Mr. Case, in which he suggested a reformulation of  
11 this problem, so that we put the time period first and  
12 then go through those three levels.

13 MR. BOND: In essence, aren't we saying, Well,  
14 perhaps we might have new reapportioned Legislature which  
15 might be responsible? We really don't trust their di-  
16 vorce of the people so we aren't going to let them  
17 apportion. I am opposed.

18 THE CHAIRMAN: Dr. Burdette?

19 DR. BURDETTE: I would speak in favor of the  
20 Legislature doing it, not alone on the ground of separa-  
21 tion of powers, but I make the point that here I agree with
